I want to learn to boot my projects using a NodeMCU. I would like to know where the NodeMCU Linux bootloader is located. I am using the sample startup code which requires me to copy the NodeMCU Linux in /sys/kernel/debug/mcuapp/media/usart. Where is the NodeMCU Linux booted from? A: First, what is a NodeMCU? The NodeMCU is a low-cost microcontroller board with an Atmel Mega core and 32KB of Flash memory. The hardware I2C, SPI, and UART ports, a 15-bit ADC, CAN socket, and an SD socket are built in. You can read more about it here. So, let's connect everything up. Here is a screenshot of my NodeMCU development environment. It has an Atmel Mega core, 32KB of flash memory, a breadboard, a prototyping board, a power supply and a keyboard and a screen. The mini USB port is used as a serial port. I have a USB->serial cable plugged into the mini USB connector. The NodeMCU is connected to an AM335x Mega core, which provides serial console access. The web interface is running on the NodeMCU board. The web service provides you with a web interface to control the NodeMCU. By default this is located at The NodeMCU was programmed on an Atmel ICE mkII board. When you boot the NodeMCU, you can find out where the NodeMCU Linux is loaded by examining the serial console. Here is the terminal log when I turned on the NodeMCU. The BOOTSTATE string is: BOOTSTATE=3 This indicates that I am booting the NodeMCU Linux. The Linux code loads as

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
