- **Make It Appealing**

- **Provide Balanced Information**

It is best for a writer not to reveal all of their thoughts in one paragraph. One thing you should do as a writer is strikes a balance between too much and too little information. If you write too little, your reader will be perplexed and will miss the main point.

However, if there is too much information, it will be difficult for your reader to understand what they are reading. Also, a lot of information on one topic in each paragraph indicates that you're probably struggling with word choice or sentence structure.

- **Include Important Information**

Your paragraph should include details that support the idea introduced in your topic sentence. If your topic sentence introduces an idea, use transition words to connect it to other paragraphs.

Avoid startling readers by introducing new information without first warning them in the text.

Any ideas introduced in the paragraph's opening line should be strengthened by the paragraph's supporting sentences. These lines will serve as building blocks for future points throughout the body paragraphs of this section. Remember not to be afraid of transitions between topics; otherwise, readers may feel disoriented when new concepts are introduced. 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- **Make It Worthwhile**

A good topic sentence should be brief and to the point. It is not as important to get to your point quickly as it is to do so clearly. Furthermore, a strong introduction is critical for engaging readers from the first few words of your paper. This means avoiding overly wordy introductions in favor of short, snappy sentences that get right to the point while still packing a punch.
